MOTORCYCLE SAFETY

Motorcycle mishaps take the lives of our Marines and sailors. To improve safety the Marine Corps established a mandatory training program for Marines and Sailors interested in owning or operating a motorcycle. The required instruction is standardized through the Motorcycle Safety Foundation and is accepted by the Department of Motor Vehicles as a certified riders course.

"While the total number of accidents has increased, we've seen the number of fatal accidents go down. We've also seen fewer Marines taking advantage of available training. We have the funding to put Marines and sailors through these classes and it's worth it if we continue to see fewer mishaps."

Class A: An accident that results in death, permanent total disability and/or more than \$2,000,000 in damages.

Class B: An accident that results in permanent partial disability, three personnel hospitalized and/or less than \$2,000,000, but greater than \$500,000 in damages

Sailors and Marines belonging to MFR can enroll in Motorcycle Safety Foundation Classes for free through the Marine Forces Reserve Safety Office. Unit ground safety managers are the liaison to Marine Forces Reserve Safety Office and can help Marines and Sailors coordinate payment for Motorcycle Safety Foundation Classes.
