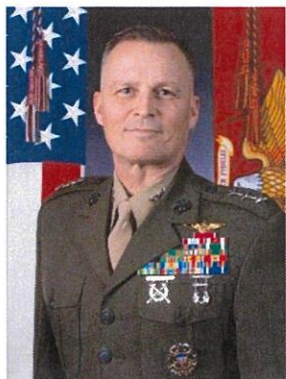


COMMANDER MARINE FORCES RESERVE
