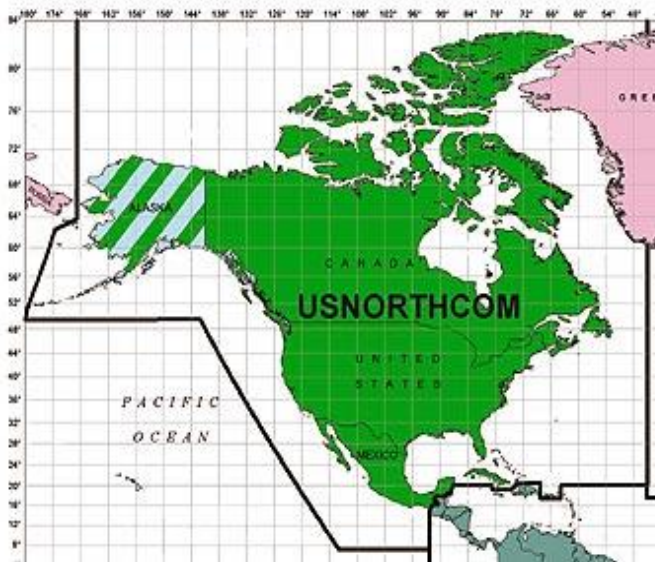

THEATER SECURITY COOPERATION

CIVIL SUPPORT



A fire team of Marines from Company I, 3rd Battalion, 25th Marine Regiment, based out of Buffalo, N.Y. and soldiers with the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry, Canadian forces from Hamilton, Ontario, rush to a series of obstacles during door-breaching training as part of a small scale squad patrolling and MOUT exercise with the Canadian military. The purpose of the training was to exchange infantry strategies and tactics.

Hummer also serves as the commander of Marine Forces North (MARFORNORTH), the Marine Corps Service component to U.S. Northern Command (USNORTHCOM).• USNORTHCOM was established Oct. 1, 2002 in response to the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. Its mission is to conduct homeland defense, civil support and security cooperation to defend and secure the United States and its interests.• Per MARADMIN 589/05, the Marine Corps provides a dual-capable force in support of civil authorities. This means leveraging our expeditionary warfighting capabilities for civil support – i.e. an MV-22 carries Marines, ammunition and supplies but can also be used to support a FEMA effort by carrying refugees, water, and MREs.• DOD military forces have the lead role in providing for the defense of the U.S. but serve in a supporting role to civil authorities like a state governor, FEMA, or the Secret Service when conducting civil support operations. The Stafford, Economy, and Posse Comitatus Acts ensure that military forces can provide support to civilian authorities when directed, but cannot become directly involved with law enforcement.• Like USNORTHCOM, MARFORNORTH has few permanently-assigned forces, therefore, operating forces (Reserve or Active) are “attached” to the command to carry out missions within its area of responsibility (AOR), which includes the continental U.S., Alaska, Canada, Mexico, Bermuda, the Turks & Caicos, Saint-Pierre and Miquelon, the Straits of Florida, the Gulf of Mexico, and portions of the Caribbean to include the Bahamas, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. and British Virgin Islands. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• MARFORNORTH executes antiterrorism and force protection responsibilities, plans for the use of USMC forces, and advises on the proper employment of such forces. The command also coordinates with and supports USMC forces when attached to USNORTHCOM in support of DSCA and homeland defense (HD) operations.• MARFORNORTH executes its responsibilities in three distinct categories: Mission Assurance (MA), Theater Security Cooperation (TSC), and Civil Support (CS).<ul style="list-style-type: none">• <u>MA</u>: executes antiterrorism and force protection responsibilities in order to protect Marines, DOD civilian employees, DOD contractors, families, and USMC facilities within the AOR.• <u>TSC</u>: conducts train-the-trainer and subject matter expert exchanges with regional partners to enhance regional security for all.• <u>CS</u>: includes domestic disaster relief operations that occur during fires, hurricanes, floods and earthquakes. Support also includes counter-drug operations and managing the consequences of a terrorist event employing a weapon of mass destruction.• Historically, the Reserve component was restricted from participating in Defense Support of Civil Authorities operations, but the FY 2012 National Defense Appropriations Act gave the Secretary of Defense statutory authority to use the Reserve component in support of domestic incidents (Title 10 United States Code, Section 12304[a]). This statute enables a Marine Corps “Total Force” response. |
